Waukesha Lodge Announces Fund Raising Spaghetti Dinner

(Waukesha, WI) – Waukesha Masonic Lodge #37 is pleased to announce a special spaghetti dinner on Saturday, October 14, 2006. The dinner will be prepared by BRAVO! Restaurant and held at the historic lodge building, located at 317 South Street, in downtown Waukesha.

This special dinner is a fundraiser for the Lodge. “Unfortunately, dues alone are no longer paying the bills,” said Worshipful Master Gary Ebert. “Any extra funds left over will go towards our scholarship funds, our building fund or the Masonic relief fund,” added Ebert. “Of course, if any man attending is interesting in finding out more about Freemasonry or becoming a Freemason, there just might be one or two of them around to help answer any questions he may have,” joked Ebert. Tours of the historic lodge building will also be available.

Tickets are \$7 in advance, \$7.50 at the door for adults; \$4 in advance, \$4.50 at the door for children 4-12 years of age; and children age three and under are free. The dinner includes: spaghetti with meat sauce; garlic bread; salad; vanilla ice cream and coffee, milk or soda. In addition, homemade desserts will be available for purchase. Furthermore, you can dine in or carry out.

“We’ve put a lot of work into this event and hope that by having BRAVO! Restaurant and its staff prepare the dinner that families, friends, neighbors and fellow Freemasons will attend and we’ll have a good turnout. A good time is sure to be had by all,” added Ebert.

Built in 1905 and located at 317 South St. in downtown Waukesha, the Waukesha Masonic Lodge has been designated a local landmark by the Waukesha Landmarks Commission, because of the building’s architectural and historical significance. Tours are available by request.
